

HOW TRIPURA GOT ITS NAME



THE ORIGINS

Tripura's name derives from two mythological stories:

Siva Purana: Tripur, a strong monarch, was a devoted follower of Shiva. Other gods, feeling neglected, duped him into believing false scriptures, ruining both him and his kingdom. Shiva demolished the corrupted Tripur, and the area became known as Tripura.

tyrant king, ruled and outlawed Shiva worship. The villagers pleaded for help, and Shiva intervened by slaying Tripur. A noble monarch replaced him, and the region was named Tripura after the first king.

HISTORY





Tripura, a state in northeast India, has a rich and colourful history.

It was first dominated by indigenous tribes and kingdoms before falling under the Manikya dynasty's long reign beginning in the 14th century. The Manikya monarchs had a profound influence on the region's culture and civilization.

Tripura came under British authority in the 19th century after signing a treaty with the British East India Company, and it remained a princely state until India attained independence in 1947.

Tripura had hurdles following independence, including ethnic conflicts and insurgencies, which resulted in periods of turmoil. Despite these hurdles, the state has made progress in development, however issues such as ethnic conflict and economic inequities remain.

FACTOFILE: HOJAGIRI DANCE

#1

The Reang people of Tripura perform a folk dance known as Hojagiri. Tripura has 21 scheduled tribes, one of which being Reang or Riang. The correct title for this ethnic group is Bru, however the word Reang was accidentally inserted by the Indian government during the census count.

#2

Women and young girls, in groups of four to six, perform the dance while singing, balancing on an earthen pitcher, and manipulating various props, like an earthen lamp in one hand and a bottle on the head, only moving the bottom half of their bodies. Its charming melodies, enhanced by the khamb, cymbals, and bamboo flute, are what make it appealing.

#3

The dance is done during the Hojagiri festivals or Laxmi Puja, which takes place on the full moon night after Durga Puja. On this day, people worship the goddess Mailuma (Laxmi).

#4

The male members sing the lyrics and play the Kham and Sumui (kshumu). The lyrics are quite simple. The dance requires a BAILING, a broad circular rice cleaning product made of cane, a pitcher or kalash, a bottle, a house hold traditional lamp, a plain plate, and a handkerchief for each dancer.

#5

Slow hip and waist manoeuvring requires substantial training and rehearsal. It takes approximately 30 minutes to complete the sequence. This dance demonstrates the entire Huk or Jhum cultivation process.

CAKES AND BAKES

#RECIPE CORNER

enjoy having Tripuri people cakes. No celebration is complete without cakes, whether religious, ceremonial, or gathering. Tripuri cake's major component is Guria rice. There are various types of Guria rice, but the jhum variety is the most popular since it has a pleasant scent and is delicious. In addition to guria, the cakes are made with the Mimi rice variety. Some cakes are made entirely with Guria rice, while others are combined with other types of rice. Some cakes contain whole rice, while others are manufactured with rice flour. Some recipes include sugar, while others do not. Some are prepared with sugar, some are with out sugar. That is why it is even healthy and not restricted to diabetic patients and to hypertensive heart disease patients; no oil is used in most of the preparations. Some of the preparations are viz. Bangwi, Songkran, Awanbati, Pengmani, Songmani, Beleb etc.



MCREDIENTS

1. Mami rice: 2 kg.

2. Lairu leaves: 25 pc.

3. Ginger: 150gms

4. Cashew nuts: 200 gms

5. Ghee or butter oil: 200

6. Resins : 100gms.



AWAN BANGWI

It is a unique type of cake made exclusively by Tripuri. This cake is made with a rare sort of leaf called LAIRU. Besides, banana leaves can be used. Nowadays, thick aluminium foil has also been effectively adopted. Many varieties of bangwi are prepared, including plain bangwi, which is made solely with guria rice, onion, and ginger. Cashew nut-Resin bangwi, which contains nuts, resin, and ghee; pig Bangwi, which has small bits of pig and fat; and so on, with various combinations available to the consumer.



- 1. Soak the Mami rice for 4-5
- 2. Peel off the ginger, chop it finely.
- 3. Separate each half of cashew nuts in two.
- 4. Soak the resins for 1-2 hours.
- 5. Wash and clean the lairu leaves, and soak the canes in water.
